From Just Solutions

In preparation for the outcomes of the 2024 federal election, Just Solutions engaged over 70 leading policy experts from national and state environmental, climate, racial, economic, public health, housing, Indigenous, and immigrant justice organizations to compile policy solutions with the most potential impact given the federal election outcome. This culminated in a collaborative report, Defending and Advancing Climate Justice Policies, designed to address potential challenges to climate and environmental justice in the United States under the current makeup of leadership in Washington, DC. The report also proposes mitigating actions to address these threats, including at the state and local levels, as well as strategic litigation and federal oversight actions. This information is for advocacy-grassroots organizations as they develop and implement their agendas and pathways for action to advance climate justice.

In a recent trio of policy briefs, we highlight how states can seize a vital opportunity to update their residential energy codes, making homes healthier, more affordable, and more resilient in the face of climate change. By adopting the newest standards, states can slash greenhouse gas emissions and improve indoor air quality—especially for historically marginalized communities who often bear the brunt of energy-inefficient housing. The briefs offer policy insights and practical recommendations to help advocates, policymakers, and communities work together to ensure that code improvements deliver equitable benefits and set a foundation for long-term climate resilience.

From Our Partners

The Pacific Northwest is bursting with climate justice advocacy. In Oregon, Coalition of Communities of Color and other energy justice advocates secured vital victories at the Oregon Public Utility Commission, including measures to protect low-income customers from disconnection for nonpayment, expand bill discounts for those struggling with high energy bills, and limit rate hikes. In a major step forward, the PUC also required NW Natural—Oregon's largest gas utility—to begin phasing out line-extension allowances (subsidies that expand the fossil gas system). Although the Commission curbed NW Natural's proposed rate increases, the fight continues to reduce dependence on fossil fuels and keep energy costs affordable for all.

In Washington, Front & Centered released <u>Lessons from IVAN-Washington</u>, a policy paper born from collaboration with frontline communities, government agencies, and other partners. The report spotlights how fragmented agency responsibilities often leave environmental violations unaddressed and difficult for residents to report. The report recommends a single, statewide tool to streamline reporting, boost accountability, and strengthen community health and equity. Moreover, as the legislative session wraps up, Front & Centered is also advancing budget priorities that meet Washington's obligations to frontline communities. These proposals include:

- An Environmental Justice Fund to support community-driven EJ solutions beyond the standard two-year budget cycle
- A Statewide Environmental Violations Reporting Tool (as called for in Lessons from IVAN-Washington)
- Funding for Regional and Identity-Based Community Assemblies to guide climate and environmental justice investments

Policy Pulse: Federal Updates & Opportunities

Over the past few weeks, the Trump Administration has escalated its campaign against federal grants linked to "environmental justice," "DEI," and similar programs— suspending, freezing, or outright terminating awards for states, nonprofits, and other recipients. Many environmental justice grantees have received termination letters or noticed that their funds are on hold in the ASAP system. While the Administration is leaning on executive orders attacking Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion to justify these moves, courts have already ruled in several cases that such terminations are likely unlawful.

There have been a handful of cases challenging the Administration's attempts to cancel DEI-related grants, but in <u>National Association of Diversity Officers in Higher Education v. Trump</u>, a <u>preliminary injunction</u> blocked the Administration from pausing or terminating obligated grants. However, the Fourth Circuit has <u>stayed</u> that injunction pending appeal, creating ongoing uncertainty about federal agencies' actions. Despite these legal obstacles, we anticipate more attempts to sidestep or reinterpret the injunction. We're monitoring these developments in real-time and encourage grantees to stay vigilant.

Along with partners at the <u>Climate and Clean Energy Equity Fund</u>, we're preparing a memo on the implications of these anti-DEI executive orders, plus <u>an explainer on various related orders</u>. As soon as new rulings or rules take effect, we'll share updates and more resources.

Here's advice from our partners at **Environmental Protection Network**:

Stay Connected and Informed

- Update Your Information: Lawyers for Good Government (L4GG) is gathering the latest updates from grantees via their <u>intake form</u>. By providing your details, you'll receive relevant templates, referrals to pro bono legal and communications support, and possible connections to litigators.
- Utilize Pro Bono Resources: L4GG will be offering under-resourced grantees multiple hours of free legal assistance. The Environmental Protection Network (EPN) also offers 1:1 guidance on technical and compliance questions.
- Join <u>Webinars and Office Hours</u>: L4GG, EPN, NRDC, Communities First, and others are hosting regular sessions (2nd and 4th Wednesdays, 12:30-2pm ET) covering financial management, procurement, and more—plus targeted sessions for specific grant programs.


Push Back on Suspensions or Terminations

- Send a Template Letter: If your funds are frozen (or otherwise held up), consider using L4GG's <u>draft letter</u> to formally request a resolution from the EPA.
- Coordinate Legal Strategies: L4GG and other partners are actively researching ways to respond to unilateral terminations and may have additional guidance soon.

Tell Your Story

- Contact Local Media: Sharing how your project benefits communities—creating jobs, reducing pollution, aiding veterans, and more—helps build public support. <u>EPN</u> can assist with <u>media prep</u> and outreach strategies.
- Engage Elected Officials: Ask your representatives for help. You can use
 this <u>sample letter</u> or even meet with members of Congress during their
 district visits to encourage them to intervene on your behalf.
